

## BIL at a glance State Fact Sheet Virginia

U.S. Department of Transportation

- \$7.7 billion over five years in Federal highway formula funding for highways and bridges.
- \$166 million over five years in formula funding to reduce transportation-related emissions, in addition to about \$189 million over five years to increase the resilience of its transportation
- \$13 billion over the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act levels directly into improving roadway safety
- \$1.2 billion over five years under the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law to improve public transportation options across the state
- Electric Vehicle Charging Stations
  - \$106 million over five years to support the expansion of an EV charging network in the state
  - Opportunity to apply for grants out of the \$2.5 billion available for EV charging program
- Freight rail efficiency and safety
  - Eligible to compete for \$10 billion for rail improvement and safety grants, and
  - \$5.5 billion for grade crossing safety improvements.
- Airport Improvements Approximately \$386 million for infrastructure development for airports over five years
